World Literature, in Spanish Two Evenings with Chekhov Marcos Ordóñez



A doctor by profession, the Russian writer and playwright **Anton Chekhov** is considered one of the most important storytellers of world literature. Through a reading and analysis of a selection of his letters, the writer and lecturer at the Universitat Pompeu Fabra **Marcos Ordóñez** will describe Chekhov's life and work.

The painter, sculptor and engraver Rafael Canogar, the founder of the group El Paso and winner of the Premio Nacional de Artes Plásticas, will take us on a journey through his life and creative works with the art historian Víctor Nieto Alcaide. who describes him as follows: "For Canogar, art is precision, reflection, the projection of a theoretical rationality".

Considered one of the greatest figures in contemporary Greek poetry, Constantine Cavafy will be discussed by one of his most distinguished translators, Ramón Irigoyen, who is also a poet, columnist and essavist.

Explorers, Conquistadores, Travellers

This lecture series is about figures as disparate in time as united by their adventurous spirit. From Alexander the Great (356-323 BC) –considered one of the most important military commanders in history– to the marine explorer Jacques-Yves Cousteau (1910-1997), the rest of the men to be discussed are the Venetian merchant Marco Polo, the conquistador Hernán Cortés, the German explorer and geographer Alexander von Humboldt, the biological author of the evolutionary theory of the origin of species Charles Darwin, the British doctor and missionary David Livingstone and the archaeologist, writer and officer of the British army T. E. Lawrence, better known as Lawrence of Arabia.


